Repent or Perish

At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.'

SOME THOUGHTS

The word repent conjures images of fiery evangelists preaching from the pulpit at the 'unsaved'.

The emphasis on the benefits of repentance being freedom from the threat of everlasting punishment in hell. So, like many reared in such an environment, the goal in life was to become a 'good person'. Life became a list of what we ought to do and another list of what we ought never do. This was until the spiritual discipline of confession and the freedom from the 'tyranny of goodness' is realised. The fact is that repentance is not a onetime event but one of those lessons we learn over and over. This does not mean that we ignore dubious habits but that we are able to struggle with them and still be a person of integrity. We do not want just to avoid breaking a rule to avoid punishment. To repent is to recognise what we have done or said does not reflect the nature of God and there is a commitment to change this.

And the season of Lent is a time of repentance. It is a time of 'examen'.

Many of us have grown up in a religious environment focused on 'doing good'.

Indeed, this tyranny of having to be good, as it was defined in our religious subculture, often was a barrier to a life of prayer. Our prayers seemed inadequate as a means of relating to the Holy God.

In the story of the prodigal son, the time spent in the far country was not primarily a rebellion against the public customs or rules of his father. He was rebelling against the relationship of love offered by his father. This offer did contain expectations he did not want to face.

To be loved by God and to accept the gift of that love is to become responsible for how our life is lived out as a chosen child of God.

There is a lot more spiritual empowerment in that position for a Christian than in the position of trying to be good and following all the rules. The prodigal's life after he returned would be totally different from the life he lived before he left home or the rebellious life he lived in the far country. After experiencing his father's welcoming love, he would have to respond to this as an adult rather than as a child.

To accept a gift that God has given to us first requires a confession. Honest confession leads to a freeing of the Spirit from the tyranny of sin . Often when we are blessed with a gift from God the challenge lies in our willingness to accept the responsibility of that gift. To deny the gift and its responsibilities, is to deny the love of the giver. **SELAH**

Like us, clouds have many moods. Really dark clouds symbolise darkness and coming rain. Some clouds signal a coming storm.

Winds come and drive the clouds away, and we have blue skies and sunshine. Spring and summer arrive according to nature's seasons.

On their journey to the Promised Land, the Israelites were protected and guided by an overreaching cloud by day and a pillar of fire at night.

God was with them all the time and all the way, on the Mount of Transfiguration. God spoke to Peter, James and John, out of a covering cloud. Jesus was transfigured before them, his clothes dazzling white and his face shining like the sun. God spoke out of the cloud and said, "This is my son, the Beloved, in whom I am well pleased, listen to him." Sometimes clouds make us sad and gloomy, according to our moods. Yet above the clouds shine the sun, moon and the twinkling stars, taking their turn in heaven's cycle.

When the clouds are lifted and the sun shines we know all is well.

And there is more. The Psalmist put it this way:

"O Lord my God, you are very great,

You are clothed with honour and majesty, wrapped in light as in a garment.

You stretch out the heavens like a tent, you set the beams of your chambers on the waters, you make the clouds your chariot, you ride on the wings of the wind, you make the winds your messengers, fire and flame your ministers." (Psalm 104:1-4).
