

Bible Readings for Sunday August 25

Pentecost 14

1 Kings 8:(1,6,10-11), 22-30, 41-43 and Psalm 84; Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18 and Psalm 34:15-22; Ephesians 6:10-20; John 6:56-69



Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.' He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

The Words of Eternal Life

When many of his disciples heard it, they said, 'This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?' But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, 'Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, 'For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father. 'Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So Jesus asked the twelve, 'Do you also wish to go away?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.

SOME THOUGHTS

To look honestly at oneself takes tremendous courage. It requires that we strip away all the masks and make - believe we have hidden behind over the years using them to create a false feeling of well-being and dishonest self -esteem. When we look closely and honestly, what is left is not pretty.

To look honestly at oneself in an attempt to change, requires a humility that only God can give.

Through self-reflection and the forgiveness of God, the gifts of humility and honesty, free us from selfish pride and the need for self-aggrandisement. We all long to know who we are – to become full, complete persons.

Authenticity is best developed under conditions of acceptance, understanding and genuineness. We can achieve this through our encounters with others, with courage and openness.

Christians who accept the basic tenets of God's love and forgiveness are better able to accept themselves and are better equipped to cope with the feelings of isolation that are prevalent today. Authenticity, integrity and adaptability are developed as we let God release us from our emotional prisons.

Life in Christ frees, transforms and provides us with the strength to overcome the barriers to becoming real. This enables us to learn to set realistic goals and deal with unsatisfactory conditions in everyday life. Paradoxically, as we abandon ourselves to God we become more free to realise our full potential.

What God has given us is not to be regarded as a static endowment.

Our character can be refined. Our behaviour can change. Our convictions can mature our gifts can be cultivated. Scripture and Christian history are full of examples of the transforming grace of God.

Grace gives us the personal and moral resources both to push back some of the limits of nature and nurture and to come to terms with what cannot be changed.

In both cases our personal freedom is thereby expanded. We are indeed free to be different, by God's grace and for his glory. We all long to know who we are – to become full, complete persons who are real to ourselves and others. We often hide from our true feelings and depend on others for our sense of reality.

Authenticity is best developed under conditions of acceptance, understanding and a genuine self- image. All gifts of God given freely to those whose identity is found in him
