

Jesus Calls the First Disciples



Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the

deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him. **Luke 5:1-11**

#### SOME THOUGHTS

Contrary to popular opinion, I believe it could be said that stubbornness is a virtue.

Sometimes the only difference between success and failure is the refusal to give up.

We have only to consider the history of human progress against disease to realise that it is the persistence of scientists and doctors that has wrought healing in many lives.

Perhaps our theology is remiss when we function in prayer as if, once we have made a petition, then God has heard it, and we do not need to do anything else.

But there are many examples in scripture of vehement prayer, which models persistence for us. Moses both interceded for the Israelites, and begged God to take them off his hands.

He was constantly in touch with Yahweh during that 40 year trek through the desert.

Isaiah contended with God: Jeremiah pleaded for judgement: Hannah prayed so fervently that the priest thought she was drunk.

In Jesus' story of the persistent widow, we are told of a woman who simply will not give up on her petition for justice with an unfair judge. It is her persistence alone that overcomes the judge's intention to ignore her. She obviously had no social, political or economic power to leverage his response. What is the message here? Perhaps it is that we can contend with God for justice on our own accord and that persistence in prayer is important. This encouragement is particularly important when we are faced with life's challenges which persist over a significant period of time. During which, survival seems to be the only reality. At times like this prayer, becomes more honest and constant. And God seems to be like an unjust judge. We may even be uncertain that our heart-rending petitions are getting a hearing. A faithful God intervenes in His time, and we discover that flourishing and justice are possible.

It is through quietness, a state of grace, that people can be overcome by a deep inner tranquillity. It is time spent in communion, in prayer with God that this inner peace is found. **SELAH**
