

Nicodemus Visits Jesus



Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God

without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

SOME THOUGHTS

Cross-less Christianity is common in Christendom today. We are seduced by many gods.

The god of ease woos us in the form of increasing amount of household distractions and countless forms of leisure. The god of comfort likewise makes its appeal to human aspirations, through air-conditioned, landscaped homes, cars and all the trappings.

It is not that the' good life' doesn't have virtue and legitimacy.

Rather, it has become an idol to many so that when the calls for availability, personal sacrifice, commitment, reliability and service go out, the gods of comfort, ease, and convenience are under threat and the task falls to the few. On the other hand, part of discipleship involves taking up one's cross, which is a daily death to self and a newness of life in Him.

Ultimately the nub of salvation is deliverance from the claims of self and its tyranny.

Why then does it so often seem that a cushion rather than the cross is the central symbol of the gospel.

Could it be that we have stressed too much the good news of what God has done, still does and is yet to do for us and too little about what we are invited to do for Him?

The unwelcome tidings of confession and repentance from sin, and the surrender of our lives to Christ's new management as Lord, are just the beginning of authentic discipleship.

In one of his works, Soren Kierkegaard likens many Christians to train passengers traveling through a threatening terrain of hostile people and wildlife. There is a tendency to dip into the bible to enjoy its scenery, comforts and novelties, in order to console or bless our lives. But an unwillingness to step out of the security of being a biblical passenger, to become involved in the dangers and challengers of the countryside around. Cynical perhaps, but uncomfortably close to the truth as well. Growing, maturing Christians are those who dare, by contrast, to pay any price, tackle any task, accept any challenge and be of service for Him who has grasped and called them for his own. To paraphrase the words of the late John F Kennedy, they ask not what Christ and his church can do for them, rather they ask what they can do for Him, his church, and the world.

To be people of faith, without being driven. Willingly and gladly seek to do good to everyone, serve everyone, suffer all kinds of hardships, for the sake of the love and glory of GOD.
