### The Rich Man



As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, 'Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?'

Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: "You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honour your father and mother." 'He said to him, 'Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth.' Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving,

for he had many possessions.

Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, 'How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!' And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.' They were greatly astounded and said to one another, 'Then who can be saved?' Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.'

Peter began to say to him, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.'

#### **SOME THOUGHTS**

How many of us remember what Jesus said about the simple life.

Of course, we could always go through the familiar texts from the gospels of Luke, and Mark and the Acts of the Apostles, one after the other, where Jesus quite clearly says that we should live simply in this world. But then it would look as if the point was simply to convince or inspire people to live the simple life. But then unless people have really found the truth of what Jesus is saying and are inspired by it for its own sake, the words themselves will have no long-term effect.

All too often preachers have tried to motivate people through guilt feelings or fear, saying, 'You have to do this or that, otherwise God won't love you.'

And if we do the thing in question, out of fear alone, then we might as well not do it, because heart, head and gut are at war with one another. How is it that after two thousand years of meditation on Jesus, we have managed so effectively to avoid so much of what He taught us so unequivocally.

So many have avoided the Sermon on the Mount and the unmistakable teaching of Jesus on poverty. We only have to look around to see how many of us have evaded Jesus' clear directive on non-violence. And then there is his straightforward doctrine of loving your enemies.

Jesus is too much for us. The church is a kind of collective teenager. It could be said that in our maturation process as a Christian Church we have grown so slowly. Perhaps we are finally getting ready for the gospel to talk directly to us. We are ready for answers. But Jesus does not offer us many certainties. He offers us a journey of faith. Jesus doesn't give us many answers. He tells us what the right questions are, what questions the human soul has to wrestle with to stumble onto Christ and the truth.

Our questions determine what we ultimately find and discover. The challenge often lies in the interpretation of scripture and in the fact that until now the Gospel has been interpreted by a small elite group, usually educated white men. Increasingly though, the interpretation is being offered by people from other base communities who offer a different interpretation of the text.

Then revelation comes to the reader through the Holy Spirit. Whatever the case, to trivialize Christ's words by not responding to the hard instruction is to reject the truth of the Gospel which promises us a way that leads to God and a way to one another.

# Presbytery of North East Victoria, October 2024 Chairperson's letter of Encouragement

Dear friends,

Sometimes, when I sit down to write to you, words just fly off the paper. This has not been one of times. Strangely I know what I have wanted to convey to you, but the words have not come - just so – until now. Sleeping on it has helped and sometimes we just have to trust our own thoughts and words, so here goes.

When Jesus came, he came proclaiming the good news that the Kingdom of God was at hand. This is the gospel of Jesus the Christ: the kingdom of God is at hand. With this letter I have sent a little video clip to show you what I think Jesus meant by at hand. If you look at the clip you will see a blacksmith at work with tools laid out so that he can reach out his hand and take hold of what he needs. Jesus is saying this is how close the kingdom is – so close, we can reach out and take hold of it. If you look at the clip again, you will see there is something solid and dependable about those tools in a line. There is no mistaking that they are real, that they are there. The kingdom of God is so close that we can reach out, almost without looking, and take a hold of it. It is real and solid and dependable and when I think about it, useful for the task of creating with God something beautiful or useful, or fit for purpose. <a href="https://youtu.be/BelO9UR2L7M?si=jAsqbR380FdqcyWx">https://youtu.be/BelO9UR2L7M?si=jAsqbR380FdqcyWx</a>

When Jesus talks about the kingdom of God, or the reign and rule of God, he is drawing heavily on the Old Testament book of Isaiah: where God-like justice leads to peace (2:1-4); where oppression is ended, where relationships are put right (9:2-7); where God's stand with those who suffer. (11:1-10) where joy replaces shame and sorrow. (25:6-9) where creation sings because God saves (35:1-10); where there is rejoicing because God is known, where restitution is sure (60:1-22). There is more — too much for this letter so I want to take you to beginning of chapter 61, to the passage that Jesus takes and makes his own. You will know it. It begins: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news... (61:1-7). I think you could recite the rest. In every age, whether we be up or down, we have one task: to announce that the kingdom of God is at hand and then to live as citizens of that kingdom. When we do the world changes.

This is not to say we always get it right. Even in the kingdom, mid-course corrections are necessary. Sometimes the world invades, and we need to hear, again and afresh, the voice of Jesus over the clamour. We are at the beginning of a great change – a change in the way that we think, a change in the way that we understand ourselves as God's people. Right now, I suspect we need to explore things like the difference between charity and sharing our lives and our possessions, the difference between compassion and fellowship. Understanding these differences will change us. In terms of the kingdom, I suspect we are a bit like the Pharisees, almost there, but not quite. Maybe this is always the case and maybe we are always needing to make those little course corrections. Still, God is loving, and love is a tool that is as strong and as sturdy and as much at hand as any blacksmith's hammer. We can rely on it. We can lean on it. We can use it in the best sense of that word.

I want to leave you with a sentence from Isaiah today as a word of encouragement. How beautiful on the mountain are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says: God reigns!

This is the gospel, the good news of Jesus, may we live it always, Gereldine
