SOME THOUGHTS

Every day we are made promises. Advertisers promise us cheap peace, translating our wants into needs. A trouble-free existence is ours at a price.

Some preachers promise serenity without strife, tranquillity without turmoil, resurrection without gethsemane or calvary.

Jesus said there is no life except through death. The primal sin of Adam and Eve was to try to get knowledge without working for it, to arrive without the pain of the journey to attain instant godliness.

Much of our life's journey is through uncharted and unfamiliar waters. During such times we are encouraged by the words of the Lord found in, 'When you pass through deep waters, I will be with you.' Says the Lord, 'Your troubles will not overwhelm you........ For I am the Lord your God, who saves you.' (Isaiah 43:2-3)

God is good... he who gives us our lives not only rules over us but loves us. He is for us and not against us. Out of that realisation comes the ability to receive the events of life with gratitude, not resentment and to regard them as expressions of mysterious love rather than acts of hostility.

It is amazing the difference a stance of gratitude can make in the way we cope with difficulty. If we begin to look on things that happen to us as good gifts from the father, then even the problems take on a different shape. Instead of seeing them as hopeless obstacles to our happiness, we come to see them as the challenges that give life its meaning and excitement.

What would our existence be like, really, if no effort were ever called for or no challenges ever posed? Such a levelled-off-existence would be intolerably boring.

Problems cease to be overwhelming when we see them as something to be received in gratitude.

Just as it is the nature of the tide to flow in and to draw out again, so it is the nature of the Father not only to reach out in love but also to draw all things to Himself.

The Father is the source and fountain of all. He shares that life with the Son and the Spirit with mankind in a communion in which what comes forth from Him is meant to return to Him.

The Father presents himself as love, openness, self-offering, invitation, sharing in a way to which every person has the capacity to respond and to find in him his ultimate goal.

Colombia, Ecuador, Venezuela





We are thankful for

- the beauty in these countries, including in their people and cultural traditions
- persistent, patient, prophetic work of churches and ecumenical and other organizations, to establish peace with justice throughout the region, especially in Colombia
- resistance to past colonization, and to practices of today that prioritize economic ideologies over the needs of the people
- efforts by churches and people of goodwill for inclusive and respectful relations in society and government.

We pray for:

- the continued pursuit of peace in Colombia, the fulfilment of agreements reached, the reintegration of insurgents into society, broad and inclusive dialogue for justice, and fair compensation of those victimized by conflict
- the strengthening of democratically elected governments in the region, without pressure from outside interests
- greater respect for the human rights of all, especially vulnerable populations and those who work for the wellbeing of others and of the environment
- an end to the corruption in these societies, and to unsustainable exploitation of their resources.



Turn on a tap, and mostly we would simply assume clean, potable water will flow.

How often do we really consider the engineering behind the creation of that tap, or the huge but largely hidden network of pipes, filters, pumps and dams bringing that liquid gold to our fingertips?

The catchment forests, mountain streams rising from mere trickles and the pure rainfalls that swell them?

Or even the complexities of the desalination and other plants that increasingly add to our often taken-forgranted water supplies?

Then, after taking our relatively tiny sip, much of this water is in turn whisked away through another network of drains, pumps and treatments.

And all of this is usually just assumed, day after day, until possibly something goes wrong or some vision of how things are for less fortunate elsewhere forces a rethink.

It is good to stop, consider and acknowledge the many things we often take for granted.

To notice, appreciate and give thanks for the astounding dance of life that flows so abundantly around us throughout the majesty of God's creation.
